This law is designed to protect the best interests of children who are being placed outside of the state where they currently reside.





WHAT IS THE ICPC:

A statutory agreement between all 50 states, the US Virgin Islands and District of Columbia.

*Establishes uniform legal and administrative procedures governing the interstate placement of children

*Ensures the individual or entity placing the child maintains legal and financial responsibility for the child

The compact is found in section 48.988 of WI Statutes

*Note §48.99 begins the revised ICPC § 48.988 remains in effect until 35 member states enact the revised compact into law. Currently WI and 15 other states have the revised compact in their statutes

*New York first state to enact into law in 1960

*Wisconsin enacted the ICPC into State law in 1977



APHSA and AAICPC

American Public Human Service Association

Administers and oversees programs that bolster family well beingincluding the AAICPC

The Association of Administrators of the Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children (AAICPC)

Established in 1974 and is responsible for administering the ICPC and carrying out the rules and terms of the ICPC.

The Secretariat to AAICPC

Provides ongoing administrative, legal and technical assistance to the compact party states. The Secretariat works to resolve problems of mutual concern and formulates standard practice and policies.

The AAICPC Executive Committee (EC)

An elected body that works with the AAICPC Secretariat to advance policy and practice directives and initiatives to improve the national administration of the ICPC.

Compact Administrator and Deputy Compact Administrator

Each member jurisdiction designates a CA and DCA to coordinate activities within their state and ensure the ICPC is carried out effectively in their state.



Why do we need the compact?

- Ensures children are placed with appropriate caregivers who can/will meet the child's needs
- Legal and financial protections for the child
- Establishes responsibilities for both the sending state (SS) and receiving state (RS)
- Ensures continued supervision after placement is made



Does the Compact apply?

The Compact DOES apply

- Placements with parents or relatives when under jurisdiction of a juvenile court or county or state agency
 - *Exceptions that ICPC does <u>not</u> apply in some states (NY, OR)
- Placements into foster homes or group homes
- Placements preliminary to adoptions including private adoptions
- Placements into residential treatment facilities



ICPC & ICJ

 Children under both a child welfare order and a chapter 938 order may need approval from ICPC and the Interstate Compact for Juveniles (ICJ)

The Compact does **NOT** apply

- Placements to boarding school or educational institutions
- Placements to a medical facility or hospital
- Placements or home studies done internationally
- Divorce or custody proceedings
- Placements made by and to a parent, stepparent, grandparent, aunt, uncle or adult sibling with legal right to place
 - No child welfare court system involvement



Roles in the Sending State

Sending Agency -case manager

- Sending agency explores proposed resource in other state
- Prepares and submits the ICPC referral (home study request) through eWiSacwis
- Agency maintains case management responsibilities including permanency planning
- Agency maintains financial responsibilities for the child and placement (ex. Foster payments or kinship)
- Must seek concurrence from receiving state prior to case closure

Wisconsin ICPC -DCF

- · Reviews the ICPC referral once submitted
- Available for consult with agencies with specific case related questions
- · Forwards the request to the other state
- Obtains completed study and placement decision from receiving state ICPC and forwards to WI Sending agency (Via eWiSacwis)
- WI ICPC has no case management responsibilities we act as the liaison between the states



Roles in the Receiving State

Receiving Agency

- · The agency assigned to an incoming ICPC.
- Roles are either to conduct the home assessment and/or licensing or for supervision of already approved ICPC cases
- Receiving state is not responsible financially and not responsible for case management
- Receiving state agency can assist with referrals and will conduct monthly contacts with the family
- Submit quarterly progress reports to sending state
- Not responsible for services or helping meet court ordered conditions
- Provide Concurrence to close when sending state is seeking permanence

Receiving State -ICPC Central Office

- Receiving state ICPC reviews incoming referrals and assigns to their local agency for completion of home studies
- Reviews completed home study and makes final placement recommendation and forwards to sending state ICPC
- Receives DCF Form 100b notifications when placement is made and assigns to local agency for supervision
- Some receiving state offices assist with setting up Medicaid for child (this is specific to each state policy-not all states open Medical Assistance for non IV-E children)



DCF FORMS

ICPC 100A Placement Request

Sending State/Agency

- Formal written notice to the receiving state of its intention/request to make an interstate placement.
- · Request for a home study/licensing
- Includes documentation of who is financially responsible and responsible for planning/placement of the child
- · Request for a placement decision
- Signed by Sending agency representative and ICPC

Receiving State/Agency

- Following review of completed home assessment, it is the official notification that the proposed placement may or may not be made
- Signed by the State Central ICPC Specialist/Deputy Compact Administrator




DCF FORMS

ICPC 100B – Report on Child's Placement Status

- Confirm that an approved ICPC placement has been made
- Withdraw a placement request prior to the home study
- Indicate that an approved resource will not be used-so the ICPC can be closed
- Report a change in placement resource/type of care (ex unlicensed to licensed)
- · Report change of address
- Close an ICPC case-when permanence occurs, or placement ends







Ten Articles and Twelve Regulations

Articles set out the procedures to be followed to implement the compact.

Regulations help to guide the daily practice of the ICPC

- · Some Regulations have specific timeframes for ICPC processing
- · Timeframes begin when a complete referral is received

ICPC & TIMELINES

- Timelines for Home studies a variety of factors impact completion home studies. Ex. Staff shortages, background check results, fingerprinting, incorrect information, resource compliance, etc.
- SAFE AND TIMELY INTERSTATE PLACEMENT ACT (2006)
 Within 60 days a home study report should be completed-additional time permitted for licensure.



When is there court jurisdiction for ICPC purposes?

- TPC Order
- · CHIPS Dispositional Order

No court jurisdiction when:

 TPC Request or CHIPS petition has been filed but there has been no iuvenile court order entered





Protective Plans

Definition: A Protective Plan is an immediate, short-term strategy in response to the identification of Present Danger Threats. The Protective Plan is a negotiated arrangement, outside of the court process, that provides a child with adult supervision and care in order to control for or shield from identified danger threats.



Under a protective plan, an agency and a parent may agree that a child will stay temporarily with an individual outside the home (may include a resource who is out of state).



Should not be longterm and is not a formal placement



No juvenile court jurisdiction for ICPC purposes based on a protective plan being in place





In-Home CHIPS Cases



CHIPS order confers court jurisdiction for ICPC purposes, even when the child is placed in the home

ICPC guidance provides that if the parent under an inhome order seeks to move out of state, the ICPC needs to be complied with.

 "Consequently, the ICPC applies to interstate placements with parents if a child is under the jurisdiction of the juvenile or family court, the court has assumed responsibility to determine where the child will reside, and until such time as the interrupted parentchild relationship is restored and the state's intervention is ended." - ICPC Manual and Instructional Guide for Juvenile and Family Court Judges p. 34:

- Courts in some states have held that the ICPC does not apply to parental placements. See, e.g., Matter of J.B., 310 Or. App. 729 (Or. Ct. App. 2021)
- Not aware of any decisions by Wisconsin Courts or 7th Circuit Court of Appeals on this issue.



REGULATION ONE

Relocation of a family unit

Intrastate Interstate



Applies when a family who has an approved placement of a child in the home state moves to another state prior to case closure/adoption.

- The local agency will submit a regulation one request to their state ICPC-it will be reviewed and sent to the new state ICPC office
- Assigned to the local agency and a new home study will be conducted in the new state
- Supervision will begin within 30 days of notice



Applies to cases involving children who are under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court

The court or agency must have authority to determine supervision, custody and placement of the child.

If a child has been placed in the Receiving State prior to ICPC approval (Except Reg 1) the case is considered a violation of the ICPC

No supervision or services are provided prior to ICPC approval

REGULATION TWO

Placements for public adoption, or foster care and/or with parents or unlicensed





REGULATION FOUR

Residential Placement



Residential facility or residential treatment center or group home as defined as:

A facility providing a level of 24-hour care, supervised care that is beyond what is needed for assessment or treatment for an acute condition.

- Does not include institutions that are primarily educational
 - Does not include hospitals or other medical facilities

*Approval by receiving state is required prior to placement

*Both public and private cases require an ICPC under the current compact

*Also applies to children who are under a JIPS or delinquency order under Chapter 938 ARTICLE VI of the Compact

Requires a juvenile court order be included with the request that indicates equivalent facilities are not available in the sending agencies jurisdiction and that institutional care in the receiving state is in the child's best interest and will not produce undue hardship



Intent is to expedite ICPC placement decision

Only if the placement will be with:

 A parent, stepparent, grandparent, adult uncle or aunt, adult brother or sister or the child's guardian

AND

A Priority Order has been signed by the judge (not commissioner)

AND

- The court order must indicate one or more of the following circumstances exist:
 - *Unexpected dependency due to a sudden or recent incarceration or death or a parent or quardian
 - *Child to be placed is four years or younger
 - *Court finds that any child in a sibling group has a substantial relationship with the proposed resource
 - *The child is in an emergency shelter

REGULATION SEVEN

Expedited Placement Decision



- *Request must be received by ICPC within 5 business days of the judge signing the priority order
- *Receiving state has 20 business days to complete assessment
 - * Reg 7's may not be requested if the child is already in the home and may not be for licensing


REGULATION NINE-Definition of a Visit VISIT Reg 9 6.) When a child is in the home when **PLACEMENT** a request for a home study is submitted, there is a rebuttable presumption that the intent of the 30 days stay is placement, not a visit Or less 30 days Or longer Has start & end date No end date-Social or cultural experience When placement of short duration is made Friend, relative, camp, etc. has no Have an approved ICPC legal responsibility Supervision provided by RS No services or supervision will occur when child is on a visit.

REGULATION TEN

Guardianship

If the child's parent, stepparent, grandparent, adult brother or sister or adult uncle or aunt is making a placement with a nonagency guardian, whose appointment to the guardianship existed prior to consideration of making the placement, is not subject to the ICPC.







- If the guardian is appointed by the sending state court → there are grounds to terminate the ICPC when the sending and receiving state compact administrators concur on the termination.
- If, the guardian is appointed by the receiving state court → the appointment shall be construed as a request that the sending agency and the receiving agency concur in the discontinuance of the application of the ICPC to the placement.
- No additional paperwork or approval is needed for a child who reaches permanency through guardianship after a child welfare case.





REGULATION TWELVE

Private/Independent Adoptions



- Provide guidance for interstate private and independent adoptions
- Ensure the placement follows all applicable laws and requirements
- · Ensure supervision is in place until adoption is final

ICPC does not approve the adoption but provides placement approval and allows the family to travel back to their home state with the child.

Approval or denial must be made within 3 business days



ICWA and the ICPC

Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA)

- Federally enacted by Congress in 1978
- Intent to protect the best interest of Indian Children and promote stability of Indian tribes and families

Wisconsin Indian Child Welfare Act (WICWA)

- Signed into state law on December 7, 2009
- Intent to clarify and improve compliance in WI
- WI is home to 11 federally recognized tribes

Does the Compact apply to ICWA cases?

- If an Indian child is being placed interstate (and child is under jurisdiction of public child welfare agency) the ICPC applies to that placement
 - However, placement requirements of ICWA preempt any ICPC requirements
- Tribe to Tribe-Sovereign nations-ICPC does not apply if placement is made by and to a Tribe
 - · Unless-Tribe requests ICPC services
 - Tribe has adopted the ICPC into its own laws
 - Tribe has an existing Title IV-E agreements with the state requires ICPC compliance
- Full faith and credit if the ICPC is invoked and the tribe completes the home study



The home study is complete Now what...

Approval from Receiving State

- Valid for six months
- If placement is made: send DCF form 100b to sending state ICPC
- Supervision requested from receiving state
- Case must remain open for supervision until concurrence to close is received from receiving state
- Sending state maintains case management and financial support
- Send DCF form 100b to close if approval will not be used

Denial from Receiving State

- Placement may not be made
- ICPC will close
- A new request can be made in the future if documentation is provided that shows the reasons for denial have been resolved

We disagree with the denial - is there an appeal process?

There is no formal appeal process

Within 90 days of denial may submit request for reconsideration

Up to Receiving State if they will accept

Must provide evidence of what changed to impact decision



VIOLATIONS OF THE ICPC

Children who are under the jurisdiction of the courts/agency that are placed in another state prior to an ICPC approval are in violation of the ICPC

- · Consequences of placement made in violation:
 - Medicaid will not be open for the child
 - Will not be open for supervision
 - Difficulty obtaining other needed services



48.988 (4) Penalty for illegal placement. The sending, bringing, or causing to be sent or brought into any receiving state of a child in violation of the terms of this compact shall constitute a violation of the laws respecting the placement of children of both the state in which the sending agency is located or from which it sends or brings the child and of the receiving state.. Such violation may be punished or subjected to penalty in either jurisdiction in accordance with its laws....




